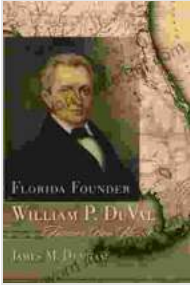


Florida Founder William P. DuVal: Frontier Bon Vivant

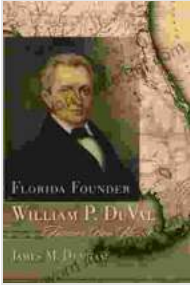
