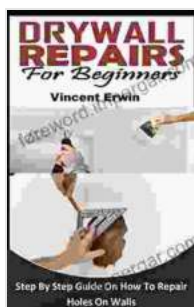

Materials You'll Need

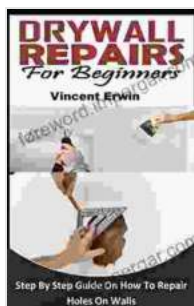
